



## LYDIATE HALL WALK

- Start at the side entrance to Our Lady's RC Churcl on Hall Lane and walk along the Lane away from Southport Road.
- B. Half way up the lane are three building on the right, the end one is the old St Josephs School. It was built in the mid 1800's
- Lane, continue until the bend in the road, join Footpath No. 5.

- As you join the path the area to the right is where the Vikings settled. It was known as Eggergarth.
- rear garden of Church View Farm to Southport Road. Turn right out of the farm, cross Southport Road and head down Church Lane. At the corner of Church Lane is St. Thomas Church this was built in 1840 from sandstone quarried in Aughton. Church Lane leads to Hollands Farm, Footpath No. 1. At the gate turn right and then left to go behind the
- At the gate turn right and then left to go behind the barns and onto the stone track at the rear. This path was part of the route used as a link from the market town of Ormskirk to the sea.
- town of Ormskirk to the sea.

  G. Turn left on Acres Lane, continue along the road until you reach a small track on the righ hand side, Intake Lane. This leads onto the Trans Pennine Trail. This section is on the old Cheshire I ines Railway that opened in 1884
- turn left off the track bed for 800m, then turn left off the track and back onto Acres Lane. Turn left on the road and join Footpath No. 20. To the left is the remainder of the woodlan that is mentioned in the Domesday Book.
- left through the trees is the remains of Lydiate Hall. The out buildings have been converted into a farm shop and café.
- Turn right on Southport Road, on the right you can see the remains of St Catherine's Chapel.
- K. Next door is the cruck framed Scotch Piper Inn.
- Continue along Southport Road, at Lollies bridge access the canal bank by the steps through the gate onto Footpath No. 8.
- M. Follow the path along the canal until the next bridge, Lydiate Hall Bridge. It was known as Billys Bridge, there are cylinders of concrete by the bridge that were left over from the war, they were used during the war to block access across the bridge in the event of an invasion. From the top of the bridge if you look in over
- ollow Footpath No. 6 across the horse gallon a rise in the ground, at the top of the rise here used to be a windmill.

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 At the end of the path turn left, this leads yo back to the start.

## TOWER AND STEEPLE WALK

- 1. Starting at Lollies Bridge, go down the steps, follow the footpath along the canal to Sandy Lane. Continue along Sandy Lane to Pygons Hill Lane.
- 2. Part way along the path you can see a fault line in the earth's crust that runs through the area.
- side of the path is a tile with the inscription. 'From this spot six churches can be seen Find them.' They are clockwise from Christ Church, Aughton to your left, St Michael's, Aughton, St Helen's, Sefton, this is the steeple between the pylons behind you, Our Lady's Lydiate, St Thomas, Lydiate and St Cuthbert's, Halsall. Depending on the time of the year, you will have to move from 'the spot' to find them all!
- 4. Turn left into Pygons Hill Lane and then right onto the footpath signed to Back Lane. Crossing the brook, turn right and the path from the gate heads diagonally across the field to the tree on the left of St Michael's spire.
  5. Follow the path's waymarkers to Back Lane,
- Follow the path's waymarkers to Back Lane, along the side of the cottage. Turn left onto Back Lane and left onto the next footpath.
- Continue along this path, shortly ahead on the left are to the ruins of Walsh Hall, a medieval moated site. Follow the waymarkers through the grounds and the horse paddocks. N.B. there are several stiles along this section

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- After leaving Walsh Hall straight ahead you can see the wind farm in Liverpool Bay as you walk down to Rimmer's Bridge over the canal.
- 8. You are now in the old area of Eggergarth.
  On the left is a manure wharf. This was used by Liverpool Corporation who brought the horse manure and street sweepings out by barge to the farmers who spread it on
- **9.** Turn left onto the Canal Towpath.
- 10. Continue along the towpath. Just after the Sudell Brook crossing, on the right is a house with a conservatory, this was the old 'Eggergarth Water Mill'.
- 11. Leave the towpath at Jackson's Bridge, No 19. Cross the bridge and follow the path down the other side of the canal.
- **12.** Continue passed the cottages, in the 1800's one of these was a 'beer house' called the 'Bug 'n'th Bucket', along the field edges back to Lollies Bridge. The steel work for this bridge was designed by Dorman Long, he also designed the Tyne Bridge in Newcastle and Sydney Harbour Bridge.
